## **Planning Commission Tables Senior Living Rezoning**

Troy Planning Commission members said they aren't being difficult, but want more information about a senior living facility before making a recommendation to city council on the rezoning needed for the proposed

The commission March 11 tabled for the second time its recommendation on the proposed rezoning from B-2 general business to Planned Unit Development (PUD) for 14.6 acres along Troy Towne Drive, just west of Interstate 75. The PUD zoning would be needed to do the project on the property that lies in the city Tax Increment Finance District (TIF).

Mark Murphy, representing the potential developers, said Feb. 11 the site was being considered for an "age in place" project with 158 units including 92 independent living units, 30 harbor units, 18 assisted living units and 18 memory care units. Harbor units were described as a transition

between independent living and assisted living.

The developers hoped to get work on the project under way this year, Murphy said.

Commission members said they are not opposed the project, which some said is needed in the community. However, they said, they want a study to show the facility's projected impact on traffic in the area and development specific covenants and restrictions.

"We are not delaying this thing. You guys need to do your homework and get back with us," said Alan Kappers, commission chairman.

The request for a recommendation on the proposed rezoning was tabled Feb. 25 after the commission asked for a traffic study and covenants and restrictions specific to this site.

At the March 11 meeting the commission received a letter from the project engineering company addressing the "necessity of a traffic impact study." The letter stated that, based on experience at a similar facility in Michigan, traffic impact would be minimal. An estimate of traffic in and out of the proposed Troy location was projected to be minimal on surrounding streets.

Patrick Titterington, city service and safety director and a commission member, said more detail is needed including how the facility traffic would affect that on surrounding streets including Experiment Farm Road to the west and Main Street to the south.

Troy Towne Drive connects to Experiment Farm Road but there is not a direct public road connection to Main Street. Instead, traffic needs to use private streets in the shopping area at Wal-Mart to reach Main Street. That area already has traffic concerns including accidents and overall driver confusion, Titterington said.

"I am not against this. It is something that we do need in Troy. It can be a very positive improvement to the TIF and the community," he said. "I

just want to know that traffic can be managed or not made any worse by adding this facility and this development."

Murphy questioned the need for a traffic impact study when estimates showed the impact would be far below numbers set by the Ohio Department of Transportation for impact studies.

"It may come to nothing but we have to do our due diligence and find out what the impact is," Titterington said.

Mayor Mike Beamish, a commission member, said he, too, was concerned about and need more information on traffic impact. He said he needed a legal interpretation of the covenants and restrictions. "I do see a lot of promise in this project," Beamish said.

Commission member Jim McGarry said the covenants and restrictions needed to be for the site proposed. His motion to table the rezoning recommendation was supported by the rest of the commission.

### **Prosecutor to Review CO** Doothe Findings Deatns r maings

Miami County's prosecutor said he'll need to review Troy police's investigation report of the Feb. 27 carbon monoxide poisoning of four youth, including three girls who died, before determining if any charges would be pursued.

In the meantime, the Troy Fire Department planned this week to begin installing carbon monoxide detectors in homes of those needing them as part of a carbon monoxide awareness effort, Acting Fire Chief Matt Simmons said.

The program is for residents of Troy as well as Concord, Staunton and Lostcreek townships, which are served by the Troy department. Residents requesting a detector should call 339-0495.

Police detectives released the investigation report March 12 hours after it was delivered to the office of Prosecutor Tony Kendell. He could not comment on what could be done with the report until he had the opportunity to review it,

The department closed the investigation almost two weeks after the four youth were found Feb. 27 unresponsive in the rental house where they had been living with their grandmother Jean Bishop. Sisters Dejah J. Alexander-Bishop, 14, and Dionanna J. Alexander-Bishop, 13, died that day and their cousin Jakia S. Jones, 12, died March 1 at Dayton Children's Hospital. Jakia's brother, Jahari Ward, 8, was released last week from

Children's Hospital. Jean Bishop had been hospitalized the night before and also was treated for carbon monoxide after the children were found, police said.

An inspection of the house's heating system showed a completely restricted air filter, a flue completely restricted with deteriorating masonry and a restricted air inlet at the burner in the furnace, Police Capt. Chris Anderson said last

One or a combination of the three issues could have created the deadly amount of carbon monoxide, Anderson said. A

furnace inspection report was included in documents given to prosecu-

The furnace was inspected for the police department by Bob Slack a technician at Troy Plumbing and Heating with 21 years experience, after the youth were

found Feb. 27. A consent to search was given by Joe Caldwell, property owner, according to documents in the report.

Caldwell's wife, Kathy Caldwell, told Detective Todd Sloan that day by phone that she knew Jean Bishop lived in the house but "had no idea that the children were in the house." She further said that she had received no complaints about the furnace and did walkthroughs of the property every three months.

Anderson said March 12 that police efforts to talk with the Caldwells after Feb. 27 were not successful.

The call to the house was made at 2:11 p.m. Sloan stated in the report that a firefighter said as soon as responders opened the door to the

house the carbon monoxide alarm they were carrying activated. However, "in the rescue and removal from the dangerous area of the children they did not take time to look at the reading (on the alarm)," he wrote. Readings were taken on the first and second floors around 2:45 p.m. with an

alert for the second floor. The first police officer to arrive, Ptlm. Jim Short, said he went into the house with the first squad and "could immediately smell a strange odor in the air." As medics worked he began opening windows for what he was told initially might be a gas leak, according to his report.

Sloan said during his photographing of the scene "I concentrated on the furnace and the large amount of soot build up on the walls in the living

#### Annexation of 34 acres sought

Documents seeking annexation of 34 acres in Staunton Township to the city of Troy have been filed with the city and with Miami County.

The land owned by Harold Trader is located north of Troy-Urbana Road and east of DeWeese Road. The Troy City Council was scheduled to consider the statement of municipal services that would be available to the land, if annexed; a requirement that any development of the land would require buffering by the property for any uses of the land incompatible with existing land uses in the township; and consenting to the annexation.

The annexation also has been filed with the county. The county commission March 12 acknowledged the filing and will vote to consent to or object to the annexation. If the county approves, the annexation would be sent back to the city for a decision on annexation.

#### Property owners to be asked about assessments

The Miami County commissioners would like to more what residents of Diana Drive and Timber Lane think about assessments to gain access to county water and sewer services.

Members of the county Sanitary Engineering Department staff talked March 12 with commissioners about an inquiry they'd received from a property owners seeking water and sewer service. The streets are located off Peters Road near Troy.

The estimated assessment for water for residences in that area would be \$16,000 along with \$19,000 for sewer, the commission was told.

### Scam of the Week

Ohio Attorney General Mike DeWine warned that consumers in Ohio and throughout the nation are reporting scam calls that appear to come from a 513 (Cincinnati) area code to obtain consumers' credit or debit card numbers.

The calls appear to be part of a "phishing" scheme, in which con artists attempt to gain a consumer's personal information by claiming that there is a problem with the consumer's account.

Although a 513-area code phone number appears on the consumer's caller ID, the calls likely are not originating from the Cincinnati area and may be the result of hacking or caller ID "spoofing," or altering.

In the past week, the Ohio Attorney General's Office has received approximately 110 reports of these calls from consumers in Ohio and other states, including Georgia, Missouri, and South Dakota.

According to consumer reports, the calls generally begin with a recorded message telling consumers that their credit or debit card has been locked or frozen. Consumers are instructed to "Press 1" to unlock their account and then are told to enter their 16-digit card number. Consumers who

supply this information may be at risk for identity

"Scammers often try to use fear to convince people to provide money or personal information," phone number and attempt Attorney General DeWine said. "No matter what a caller says, don't give out any financial information in response to these kinds of calls. If you are worried about your credit or debit account, hang up and call your bank using a number you know to be real, such as the number that appears on your monthly statement."

Consumers who receive suspicious calls should take steps to protect themselves, including:

Be skeptical of the phone number that appears on your caller ID. It could be the result of "spoofing" or hacking.

When in doubt, hang up or don't answer.

Don't respond to suspicious calls. Even if the call prompts you to press a button to "opt out," don't do it. This could cause you to receive more calls, because it signals that yours is a legitimate phone

Never provide money or personal information to someone who calls you unexpectedly, even if it

appears to be a local call. Consumers who provide credit or debit card numbers in response to a potential scam should take steps to protect themselves from possible identity

theft, such as: Call your bank to report that your credit or debit card number has been compromised. Banks may take action such as issuing

a new card number to you. Monitor your bank accounts. Look for suspicious activity, and if you find any errors, immediately notify your bank, or credit or debit card provider.

Place an initial fraud alert on your credit report. Contact one of the three major credit reporting agencies — Experian, Equifax, or TransUnion to place an initial fraud alert, which will stay on your credit report for 90 days. The alert is free of charge and will make it more difficult for someone to open credit in your

name. Victims of identity theft should contact the Ohio Attorney General's Identity Theft Unit for help correcting the effects of

identity theft. To report a scam, consumers should contact the Ohio Attorney General's Office at www.OhioAttorneyGeneral.gov or 800-282-0515.

The response to the detector program offer has been strong, Simmons said.

"Anytime we have incidents we want to look at what we did right and what we can do to be proactive," he said. "We do a lot of that to help keep the community safe." In addition to carbon monoxide those incidents could include fire, ice and "any other type of potential

hazard," Simmons said. A Troy Carbon Monoxide Detector Program also has been set up through The Troy Foundation for donations to be used to buy detectors for people who request one. 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### County Accepting **Bids for Eldean** Bridge Replacement

By Nancy Bowman

The days of trucks getting stuck under the Eldean Road railroad overpass should be a thing of the past by late

Bids for the long planned Eldean Road overpass replacement and road widening are scheduled for opening April 25 with work expected to begin in mid- to late May and completed by Nov. 1, Paul Huelskamp, Miami County engineer, said March 12.

His comments came as the county commission approved the final legislation required for the project.

"This is the fruition of a lot of work that we've gone through over the last couple of years," Huelskamp told the commissioners.

The commissioners approved set aside of the county's estimated \$700,000 share of the projected \$3.5 million project cost. The balance will be paid with federal

"It's a good way we can leverage our local funds to try and bring some of the federal money sent to Washington D.C, back to Miami county," he said.

The existing overpass at 9 foot, 8 inches has done damage to three to four trucks a year when they attempted to squeeze through the low clearance.

The new bridge will provide a vertical clearance of 14 feet and the project will allow for three versus the existing two lanes of travel on Eldean under the bridge.

The road elevation will be lowered and the railroad tracks will be raised to provide the increased clearance under the bridge.

In other business last week, the commission met with John Trott, Area 7 executive director, Workforce Investment Board, to discuss changes in federal work-

force programs. Many good aspects of the Workforce Investment Act were included in the new federal legislation that overall will allow "a lot more flexibility" in how workforce program money can be used, Trott said.

One area of concern to commissioners was a new requirement for competitive procurement for the workforce One Stop Shops such as the one on County Road 25A between Troy and Piqua. Commissioner John

"Bud" O'Brien said he realizes the changes were on a federal basis and not all job centers work as well as the one in Miami County. However, he said, he questions how anyone could competitively bid against an established job center unless the bidder, possibly a university, would have resources needed to staff and run a center ready at hand. "We will see, I guess," he said.

Trott said the department is checking into any flexibility in the procurement requirement in order to ensure investment made in local One Stop Shops is not lost down the road.

In other business, the commission:

- Approved an amended agreement with Phil Snider LLC to provide community development consulting services for administering and implementing the 2013 fiscal year **Community Housing** Improvement Program. Snider's contract was increased from \$10,000 to \$20,000. Snider has worked with the county on grant programs for a number of years.

O'Brien said Snider would assist county Development Department staff members new to the CHIP program. The staff members received different responsibilities after the decision was made to not fill the department's community development program position when the former manager left for a new job earlier this year.

- Signed an agreement with Finfrock Construction of Covington to construct a water line loop connection to UVMC to continue water service to the hospital during the Eldean overpass project construction. The company earlier bid \$99,000 on the project.

### Brukner Bird **Banding Bonanza**

Crow explained that a program started recently that focuses on bird banding. Another element of the project involves bird captures, where birds are gently and humanely trapped in nets strung around areas of BNC. Once captured, the birds are mapped for age, sex, wingspan, weight and other vital statistics. Brukner is coordinating this project in partnership with local, as well as national,

wildlife organizations. With BNC for more than a decade, Crow served first as an intern then became Curator of Wildlife. Under her leadership, the center has expanded the scope of their animal rehabilitation, research and educational outreach programs. In 2014, they recorded an all-time high

Harold E Trader filed the petition on March 9, 2015 and the first public hear ing was March 16, 2015. The annexation was requested to be expedited, which gives the council 20 days to approve providing municipal services to the area. In addition, the county must consent to the annexation in 25 days. As the proposed annexation is currently part of Staunton Township, the Staunton Township Trustees expressed concern that if the property is annexed by Troy the township will lose the area to Concord Township as has occurred in the past. The trustees plan to investigate their options to prevent the annexation. They don't object to the land development. Cron said, "Trader is a good businessman. Everything he touches turns to gold. However, I don't want to lose the land and the tax base that it represents for Staunton Township." The trustees plan to check with a legal advisor for the State of Ohio on the options available to them.

In addition, the trustees accepted a grant from OTARMA for \$500 for the MORE Grant Program. The grant for Managing Ohio Risk Exposures is a grant program offered each year that provides funds for township officials to attend Township Association Meetings, upgrades to Safety Equipment, and attend Risk Management and Safety Training.

The trustees continue to work on addressing the Johnson grass issue within the township. They will be soliciting additional feedback from community members on the impact that the noxious weed has on various areas in the community. This includes the Miami County Park District, area businesses, and local

## Gardening Commentary

#### Tree **Planting**

It won't be long and

we'll be planting trees and shrubs to enhance our landscapes with shade and color. There are a few things we need to remember when we begin to think about locating major plantings that will become rather permanent in nature. Trees especially, are going to grow rather large and we want them to be able to mature without being restricted in their growth. When evergreen trees are located strategically they will provide barriers that can reduce energy costs by blocking cold winter winds or provide shade that will give us comfort in hot summers and keep the A/C unit from running so much. If you are using a qualified landscape designer or landscape architect they will be sure the location of your major plants are located so they can mature without restriction and provide the most benefit. If you are doing the planning yourself be sure to consider all the surroundings that will affect the maturity of your major plants in the landscape. Paying attention to power lines and other utilities is critical for the unrestricted growth and maturity of the trees you are planting. It is so unfortunate to learn that after growing your plants for a decade or two that it is necessary to start hacking up a mature plant because we did not consider what the mature height would be in relation to the surroundings of the plant. Take a look at the photo's to see examples of what happens when we fail to consider all the restrictions that can have an effect on the mature size of the tree. The most frequent problem that is made is not realizing how fast plants grow and



what the mature size of the plant can become. We all know how fast 5 or 10 years can go by and this is just about the time that our "newly" planted landscape that we are installing this year will really be maturing. We don't want problems that we create now to come back to haunt us when our plants are performing so well and are doing just what we desired initially.

It makes no sense to purchase a tree because it has beautiful fall foliage or great flowers and plant it without regard to how large it will become. If you are not familiar with the plants you are getting ready to purchase then it is important to do some research or make your purchases from a nursery or garden center who can provide good information so you will not only buy the right variety but vou will plant them in the proper location for shade and with enough area to mature without harsh pruning.

There is a listing of tree varieties that can be used under electric lines that will stay small enough not to interfere with the wires, go to

#### Weather or Not

Early on in March we had fair weather, stormy weather and whether or not we wanted it, we had snow. It's fair to say we were sick of the state of weather. The saying came to mind: "Katy Bar the Door".

The popular saying was, "In like a lion, out like a lamb".

When it rained, we thought of: "It's raining cats and dogs". When we were able to get out on a sunny, windy day we found the mare's tail clouds brought the saying to mind: "Horse's tails floating, signals unsafe boating" Each morning we look

to the east for a red sky: "Red sky at night sailor's delight, red sky in morning, sailor's warning". Did you know that saying goes all the way back to the bible? Matthew 16: 2b-3 quotes Jesus as saying, "When evening comes, you say, 'It will be fair weather, for the sky is red.' And in the morning you say, 'Today it will be stormy, for the sky is red.'

March is the windy month so the following comes to mind as we check out the lake for fishing possibilities. 'When the wind is blowing in the North, no fisherman should set forth.



When the wind is blowing in the East, 'tis not fit for man nor beast. When the wind is blowing in the South, it brings the food over the fish's mouth. When the wind is blowing in the West, that's when fishing is best."

On our short trips to the post office and grocery, we look for cattle in the area fields. It is said that "A cow with its tail to the West makes the weather best, a cow with its tail to the East makes the weather least." Since cows don't much like wind in their faces, it makes sense.

 $Most \, of \, the \, past \, three \,$ months we've noticed the train whistles blowing at all three crossings in our area have been louder and clearer than usual. 'When sounds travel far and wide, a stormy day will betide." It holds true for dry and frigidly cold days and nights, too.

While all of this weather was going on, the local hometown paper was delivered on time and with a great deal of fortitude

on the part of the delivery people. We salute them for their time and efforts to keep the news coming.

Of special note to us was the history lesson of New Carlisle's Goodall Lumber Company. My family grew up with the business being our go-to place for all construction materials my father used in his business. He was a general contractor in the area, using a variety of skills which necessitated a nail apron. I still have his bib-style nail apron with all its grit and dirt from years of use. I can still see him wearing it as he stood on a ladder.

What was a curiosity to us was something on the photograph of the original Goodall building. Painted along the front of the building were items of special interest. Behind the open loft door are the words shingles, lath, Plastering Hair and other items. Plastering Hair?????

We knew you could plaster hair down with Brylcreem or hairspray

to keep it together on a windy March day. Brylcreem commercials claimed, "a little dab'll do ya". As kids we always added, "a big dab'll glue

What exactly was "plastering hair" and what did it have to do with laths? Well, to old timers the answer was simply that the two went together for a building process that was eventually replaced with dry wall.

Plastering hair was horse hair gathered or cut specifically for mixing in with lime putty and sand to make a lime-based plaster, said to be much stronger for the inclusion of the hair. Applied to laths, or strips of wood used for backing of plasterwork, the process was used in walls and ceilings across America, until replaced with the drywall sheets in the late 1950s.

We love learning about the old ways of doing things. The exact answer as to how the horse hair was gathered has been elusive though. Perhaps someone reading this has the answer and would be kind enough to share it.

And while we wait for March to go out like a lamb, we can look to the skies for signs that Katy does not have to bar the door anymore. Open doors, open windows. Watch for an evening's red sky and which way the cows are pointed. If they stand facing east, winds are from the west and fishing is on the agenda.

In the Garden of Gethsemane Jesus told his disciples to "watch and pray so that you will not fall into temptation." We know how necessary that warning was. They soon fell into temptation.

turbing. They imply that we are in danger. That is an unpleasant thought. We don't like to think about it. But warnings are given because they are neces-

One of the greatest dangers we face is not something outside of us. There are plenty of things outside of us that are a threat, but the greatest danger we face is inside of us. The danger that confronts us all is sinful pride. Pride is a serious threat to the Christian faith.

Jesus had been betrayed, arrested, and taken to trial before the high priests and the Sanhedrin. The judge and jury were hostile to Jesus. Pride made them that way. Pride caused them to reject Jesus and his Gospel. Pride can have the same effect on you or anyone else.

Why were they so vehemently opposed to Jesus? It was not because Jesus didn't prove who he was. They admitted that Jesus did miracles. They knew the Old Testament prophecies and Jesus fulfilled them. So why did they reject him? Pride.

Jesus taught that all are sinners who need to repent. They resented this. This sinful pride is also a very real threat to our own faith in Christ and attitude toward the Gospel. Like them, we are primarily interested in ourselves. How do we feel about ourselves? We are ready to look at the

faults of others but very

reluctant to look at our own. We might admit that we are not perfect but that is all we want to admit. When told about something we are doing that is not right, we resent being told we are not what we should be or that there is anything seriously wrong with us. Calling attention to sins and our need for a Savior hurts our pride.

We like the idea of eternal life but we don't like to hear that we don't deserve it. We prefer to think of it as a reward rather than as a gift from God's grace.

The Gospel about what Jesus did to save us is just what we need. But by nature we are hostile to it because of sinful pride. If we really believed that we are sinners, we would be much more eager to hear God's Word. A lack of interest can be traced back to sinful pride. Pride is dangerous

because it involves self-deceit. We start with the assumption that nothing can be seriously wrong with us. We rationalize and excuse our sins. We clearly see the sins of others but not our own. We feel like we are good and can do things that go against our only hope for righwhat God says without our conscience bothering us at all.

Pride leads us to see only good things in us. What is the truth? The Bible tells us, "There is no difference, for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." Let us see things as they really are. We are no better than anyone else, no better than the thieves and murderers. We are all guilty. The fact that we find sin in others does not make us righteous.

Pride is a very insidious thing. It makes us see ourselves as the opposite of what we are. And worst of all, it makes us blind to our need for a Savior and teousness before God.


